Course Information

Comprehensive Course Description	<p>This Course consists of two parts:</p> <p>Part 1: Introduces the fundamentals of the lumped circuit abstraction. Topics covered include: resistive elements and networks, independent and dependent sources, switches and MOS transistors, digital abstraction, amplifiers, energy storage elements, dynamics of first and second order networks, design in the time and frequency domains, and applications of analog and digital circuits.</p> <p>Part 2: Covers the design, construction, and debugging of analog electronic circuits. The main contents are: the basic principles of operation, terminal characteristics, and equivalent circuit models for diodes, transistors, and op-amps. Introduction to multistage analog amplifiers, differential amplifiers, current mirrors, and gain stages including frequency response of cascaded amplifiers and gain-bandwidth considerations. Design and lab exercises are significant components of the course.</p>
Course Description from Program Guide	<p>This course covers the design, construction, and debugging of analog electronic circuits. The main contents are: the basic principles of operation, terminal characteristics, and equivalent circuit models for diodes, transistors, and op-amps. Design and analysis of multistage analog amplifiers. Study of differential amplifiers, current mirrors, and gain stages. Frequency response of cascaded amplifiers and gain-bandwidth considerations. Concepts of feedback, stability and frequency compensation. Includes weekly laboratory.</p>
